
### **Expressive Arts 4-H Program**

### Ellen Williams, Expressive Arts 4-H Agent

- The arts experience is beneficial to youth in and of itself due to its physical, mental, social, psychological and emotional benefits.
- The arts experience can also be integrated into the teaching of subject matter (for instance, role-playing for workforce preparation)
- No prior arts experience or training is necessary.
- Each youth can participate at his or her own level of interest and skill, for recreational and/or vocational purposes.
- Expressive Arts 4-H Activities are central to positive life skill development; through arts participation, youth develop such life skills as communication, self-esteem, decision making, leadership, goal setting, socialization, and responsible citizenship.

# Expressive Arts in 4-H Delivery Modes

Independent Project

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Youth is mentored in an arts area by a volunteer or staff member (e.g., a painter assists youth in development of portfolio)

4-H Club

A club devoted to an arts project area, such as clogging or anime; or a club in which the arts are integrated into the club's activities, such as writing, art and photography for 4-H record books School Enrichment

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Arts content is infused into the curriculum (e.g., bullying prevention addressed through Roleplaying for Real Life - improvisational theatre training to address social issues )

## The Expressive Arts 4-H Program fulfills the 4-H National Mission Mandates

### S.E.T. (Science, Engineering and Technology)

- Concepts can be taught through expressive arts; for instance, the formation of a watershed taught through the use of visual media.
- -The arts themselves involve science concepts; for instance, dance involves movement science and music theory involves mathematical science.

### **Healthy Lifestyles**

- Are promoted through the physical and mental health benefits of arts participation.
- The arts are a creative vehicle for delivering healthy lifestyle messages, such as promoting nutritional health through educational puppet shows.

### Citizenship/Civic Education

- In the process of bringing their art to the community, 4-Hers are promoting positive community development.
- Through the media of art, music, dance, theatre or writing, youth can deliver messages inviting the community to citizenship involvement and volunteerism.
