Session #1 (9:30 - 10:30am)

1A - EQUINE: Barn/Farm Scavenger Hunt

You'll discover how mammary glands develop, including what develops and when. Additionally, you'll learn about the variations in milk composition across different ruminant species.

Would you like to learn about honey bee biology and discover what it takes to become a beekeeper? 1E - CANINE: Canine Careers

This workshop will also explore some of the many jobs dogs have done historically and currently. Youth will learn about how dogs have worked to support humans throughout history and today. Youth will also learn about careers that use dogs as tools (i.e. search and rescue), for research purposes (i.e. medical, psychological), as clients (i.e. veterinary, grooming), and as inspiration (i.e. art, film, write). Participants will test their knowledge of famous dogs and their significant role/job.

<u>1F – ANTHROPOLOGY</u>: Bone Voyage: Exploring Domestication Through Bones

4C – CANINE: Canine Communication

- Can you speak "dog"? And can a dog speak "human"? This workshop will explore the many ways dogs communicate their feelings and how they've evolved to speak directly to us. Participants will identify common dog communication signals, learn what they mean, and put this knowledge to work training a puppy. Youth will learn basic dog communication behaviors (i.e. body language, sounds) and what they mean. Youth will identify the appropriate emotion a dog is experiencing through pictures. Youth will practice how to safely approach and handle a dog as well as basic training techniques using positive reinforcement.

4D - RABBIT, CAVY, & SMALL ANIMAL: Genetics
